The Courage of Conscience

Do you sometimes find that you cry for "no apparent reason"?

Are there times when you "lose it" and lash out in anger, even at those you love?

Do you wake in the morning and turn to your cell phone rather than to the birdsong at your window?

Do you long for an afternoon nap or search for one more podcast to get you through the day? Could it be that your conscience is calling you? Listen—can you hear it, that still, small voice?

It seems to me that good-hearted Americans are being worn down and worn out by the immoral and immature actions of President Trump. I find it difficult to muster appropriate anger at the continued cruelties of the Trump agenda. I am stunned to exhaustion by the bully in the White House who builds a wall instead of a bridge; who uses repressive immigration laws and government agencies to force parents to abandon their children; who disrespects women again and again; who fuels prejudice and hatred against Muslim Americans; who publicly tweets hate toward transgender people; who proposes taking healthcare away from millions of Americans, and fills the halls of power with White Men Only.

What's Ahead?

Here's a look ahead at some of the exciting innovations we have planned for UUCR for the fall of 2017! For more information on any of these programs, please contact Dayna Edwards, Director of Religious Education, at <u>dedwards@uucr.org</u>.

First Fifteen: Starting in September, the children and youth will be invited to remain in the Sanctuary for the first fifteen minutes of the main service three times per month. This is a great opportunity for us to live into our values of being a welcoming congregation by being welcoming to people of all ages.

Chapel for Change: One time per month, the children and youth will gather together in Founders Hall for an hour long service that is geared toward their particular interests and needs. This service will be engaging, high-energy, and involve the youth in meaningful ways. Each "Chapel for Change" will have a social justice theme that will include a hands-on way to *change* the world we live in for the better.

Spirit Play: The K-1 and 2-3 class will be using a Montessori-based model of faith formation. This includes the adult telling a story with props and then allowing the children to respond to the story in a self-directed way.

UU Family Ministry Playgroup: On Monday mornings, UUCR will offer a space for families with children ages 3-8 years old to connect and play together. The goal of this group is to create a community of like-minded parents and children who can support each other spiritually and socially.

RE Safety Policy: The Board approved RE Safety Policy will be fully implemented. You can find a full copy of the policy <u>on our website</u>. If you are planning to volunteer more than 4 times per year, with the children and/or youth, you will get a link for a background check early in the fall. If you do not want to have a background check, but want to volunteer, please contact me directly to discuss the most appropriate way to proceed.

OWL (Our Whole Lives): We will be expanding our offerings of OWL–the human sexuality curriculum developed by the UUA and the UCC. In addition to offering 7th-9th grade OWL, we will also offer K-1 OWL in the fall and 4-6 OWL in the spring.

Coming of Age: We have updated and expanded our Coming of Age Program [CoA] so that is developmentally appropriate for 8th and 9th graders. Our CoA programming will take place in a series of retreats throughout the year. Each youth will be paired with a mentor; if you're interested in mentoring, please reach out to me through email.

Taking it Home: Each month we will offer resources for individuals and families to take their faith home and practice it in various ways. Keep an eye out in the order of service for ways to access these resources.

Creative Listening Table: We piloted the "creative listening table" in the back of the Sanctuary at the end of the last church year and it was a resounding success. We will continue to offer ways each Sunday for people of all ages to keep their hands busy while listening to the service. Each classroom is also equipped with a creative listening box, so feel free to make use of it if you are having a

meeting.

Our new artist is <u>Emily Pearce</u>, who will take us from Ellen Cornett's whimsy into the digital age. Emily began her training as an artist in Hillsborough, North Carolina. She studied woodworking, pottery, and painting from a variety of North Carolina artists and developed an interest in folk art and botanical drawing.

Emily holds a B.A. in History of Art from Yale University with a focus on the ancient Mediterranean. After graduating from Yale in 2003, she spent extensive time abroad, living and working in South Korea, Turkey, Germany, and Egypt.

Emily moved with her family to Rockville, Maryland, in 2013, where she works as an artist and cares for her two young daughters. She creates digital "finger painting" using her iPad and her fingertips, a practice she considers to be folk art for the digital age. She employs this medium to capture a variety of subjects, including street scenes, landscapes, botanicals, and culinary creations.

Emily's award-winning artwork has been exhibited in galleries in Tennessee, North Carolina, and Maryland. It is available for sale through gallery shows and at her website.

There will be a reception for Emily on August 27 in the Corridor after the service, and a discussion/ demonstration of Emily's technique and work on September 17 at 7:00 p.m.

DRAFT 5-YEAR PLAN

Draft 5-year Plan Implementing the Practice of Courageous Love and our Values of Lifelong Spiritual Discovery, Beloved Community, and A Just World

Practice Courageous Change as we strengthen our beloved community

• Increase Membership by 25% by 2020/21; Transition to two services this fiscal year, 2017/18.

Attendance at Sunday services has increased beyond the recommended 75-80% full level, some classes are full, and parking is a challenge. We want to make room for individuals and families who wish to join our beloved community **and** to support our full time associate minister.

• Develop a lay leadership recruitment and development plan by 2019/20 to be implemented in 2020/21.

We commit to recruit, support and encourage leadership to use our values to drive vital programs of our beloved community.

• Develop a Comprehensive Facilities Plan to support the staff and future needs during 2018/19.

We will need changes in the UUCR facility to enhance our activities and programs in the next five years. Items mentioned at the leadership summit include: a permanently installed video projection system in the Sanctuary, a dedicated music room, and integration of congregational IT systems.

Practice Courageous Giving in support of our Mission and our beloved community

• We will plan a Capital Campaign in 2019/20 to implement the Comprehensive Facilities Plan.

A growing congregation with added programs, facilities and trained leaders and aging buildings will require additional resources to maintain and expand.

• We will create a Stewardship Committee in 2018/19 to coordinate all fundraising events, to expand and to encourage additional fiscal support, for example, grants and to ensure adequate support for operations and programs.

UUCR's present methods for giving will be improved to offer a full range of yearround opportunities and options.

DRAFT 5-YEAR PLAN

Practice Courageous Faith as we continue our lifelong spiritual discovery

• We will increase by 10% each year, the variety of programming offered to support faith formation at home and in daily life for individuals and families in all of their diverse forms.

We will transition to a model of family ministry and faith formation of all ages by encouraging living faith in our homes. This will emphasize that the whole congregation is a teaching resource.

• We will deepen and modify 25% of current programming by 2020/21 to further engage and foster inter-generational relationships within the congregation.

We recognize that all of the adults of the congregation are faith transmitters to the younger generations regardless of their direct interaction with children and youth. We also recognize that faith formation is a reciprocal process in which generations learn from and are inspired by each other.

Practice Courageous Relationship Building as we work for a Just World

• UUCR will become recognized as a community leader in Rockville in all four of our major programs, Racial Justice, Immigration, Environment and LGBTQ in 2020/21 – 2022/23.

More than ever before, UUCR will be called upon to support our local and global community in the struggle for social justice and human rights.

• Continue Ministerial leadership and enhance lay leadership and participation by 2017/18.

UUCR will continue to take a leadership role in building connections among the diverse and dynamic faith communities in Montgomery County and the Washington, DC area to address social and political issues.

 The Coming of Age program will be revised to be more formal and include Mentoring across social justice areas in 2018/19.
UUCR will create more options for community and diversity by adding additional small ministry groups and continuing to sponsor Beloved Conversation groups in 2018/19.

Perhaps one of the most powerful beacons of UUCR is our fellowship. We wish to strengthen the bonds that create our vibrant community, build our diversity and continue to address larger social justice issues and navigate change.
