

Dear UUCR,

We have grown together in many ways in my relatively short time here. We have expanded the Our Whole Lives ministry by training three new people in Junior and Senior High OWL and three people in Elementary OWL. We have participated in Beloved Conversations and explored ways to dismantle oppression both within UUCR and in the larger world. Together we moved from one hour of programming for our children and youth to three hours of programming as we transitioned to two services. We have explored and grappled with what Family Faith Formation might look like here at UUCR. Many of you have made use of the creative listening table in the back of the Sanctuary and have welcomed



our youngest members into the main worship service more frequently. It warms my heart to see a young one sitting on a parent's lap and swaying to a hymn in the service. We progressed to a student-centered learning model with both Spirit Play and MakerSpace, giving our children an opportunity to fully experience the 4th Principle – that each person must be free to search for what is true and right in life.

Thank you! Thank you for being a part of my forming ministry and for bearing witness to my growth as a person in the last two years. It has been a great gift to watch this community grow and change, too. I will leave you with this parting meditation from one of my favorite authors, Octavia Butler:

> "All that you touch You Change. All that you Change Changes you.

The only lasting truth is Change.

God is Change."

May you find blessings in the changes to come at UUCR and in your personal life.

- The Family FUUN Choir is a music and arts ministry geared toward families with school-aged children (elementary through high school suggested but younger children are welcome too!). We will eat together, make music together, dance together, make art together, and have a ton of FUUN doing it. This program will replace both the Children's Choir & Unisons and will be co-led by Barbara Weis and myself, with occasional help from other volunteers.
- ArtsConnect is a community outreach ministry in which I hope to combine live music with spoken word and visual art. I envision this program as a way to connect with communities outside of our faith as well as using the program to lift up some of the justice issues that matter most to UUCR. This program is still in development but I hope to present a total of four events throughout the church year. Stay tuned for more updates on this intriguing new adventure!

I hope these new ministries are as exciting to you as they are to me! I can't wait to get started and I hope you'll get involved too.

He embraces and lives the values that we and all faiths hold dear. He is a leader among leaders; his heart holds us together with a deep and faithful spirit.

Let us send Kasey our gratitude, praise, and blessing on his 50th Anniversary of Ordination! Thank you Kasey.



Dear Colleagues and Friends,

I seek your indulgence as I reflect on the 50th anniversary of my ordination this Saturday. It was preceded by my organizing a Center for Theological Education in the Urban Setting that in turn helped organize the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s first initiative in the North. A picture of his speaking on the steps outside the locked doors of a deplorable intercity school remains in my office.

My theological studies included reading the sacred texts of major world religions, studying Hebrew scripture with rabbis and taking classes at Jesuit, Episcopal, Methodist, Baptist and United Church of Christ seminaries. My ordination service

was interracial and included clergy from Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Protestant faith traditions. They participated in the rite of ordination by the "laying on of hands" as did a laywoman from an inner-city human service program because I wanted to celebrate the Holy Spirit moving through laity as well as clergy.

It was avant-gard at that time and unfortunately remains the same today. It seems natural to think our particular beliefs, approach to worship and claim to divine favor are more authentic than others. Some claim to being elected by God or being God's chosen people at the exclusion of others. Under these circumstances there is no reason to associate with people of other faiths except to convert them to our superior faith tradition.

As the Interfaith Community Liaison, I have the privilege of worshipping in Eastern and Western faith traditions and becoming friends with a broad spectrum of people who are immeasurably enriching my life. What I and others are experiencing is that the more we cross lines of difference, the more we realize we are the same. Our histories and approaches to the divine are different, but as we worship and work together in service of others, we discover the divine in terms that overcome our differences.

From the Archives

UUCR's Pulpit

"Our magnificent pulpit was designed and built by Lathrop from aged walnut lumber he had been hoarding for years." -Quest, November 19, 1964

Perhaps you haven't paid much attention to the pulpit with its spare lines and lack of ornamentation. But aside from being functional, it's part of UUCR's legacy and was a key feature in the church's sanctuary space (now Founders Hall) that was dedicated in 1964. Lathrop E. Smith, a member, designed it "to fit the architect's specifications." (*Quest*, September, 17, 1964).

If the name rings a bell, it's likely because of the Lathrop E. Smith Environmental Education Center on Meadowside Lane in Rockville. Smith was a soil conservationist, a politician, and a key figure in the development of the county as farmland



gave way to suburban tracts in the mid-twentieth century. He was a leader in protecting Rock Creek's watershed, an effort that included the creation of Lake Frank and Lake Needwood.

In a program written and performed for the church's 25th Anniversary celebration in 1981, the pulpit and its creator were warmly remembered. "There was our beautiful, hand-made pulpit [at the building dedication], constructed and donated by Lathrop Smith." Later in the program, the author writes that, "Another sad passing was noted in January of 1972, when Bill Moors and Bob Doss [our first minister, who by 1972 was serving in Delaware] together conducted a memorial service for Lathrop Smith. Spring picnics at the Lathrop and Marian Smith farm had been joyous annual events in several of the early years of UCR."

So take a closer look at Lathrop's handiwork, a gift to this congregation and a memorial to a man who did much for the people of the county as well as the church.

I think this is why interfaith alliances among faith leaders are growing in Montgomery County, Interfaith Dialogues on Cultural Bias are being planned for a third year, some 60 interfaith communities are assimilating refugees, Muslims are inviting others to celebrate the breaking of their daily fasts at lifter dinners, faith leaders are inviting colleagues from other faiths to pray, teach and preach in their houses of worship.

The greatest benefit is discovering, that regardless of the name we attribute to the creator and sustain of life, we are sisters and brothers of one human family. The more we are together, the more we experience the unifying power of love dissolving our sense of superiority and leaving us humble and deeply grateful.

50 years ago I could not have imagined being an Interfaith Community Liaison in a place like Montgomery County. My brother, Martin Luther King, Jr., had convinced me of the universal power of love, but its context was largely ecumenical. Today it is profoundly interfaith. I cannot envision the next 50 years, but I'm optimistic thanks to my Zoroastrian, Buddhist, Hindu, Unitarian Universalist, Bahá'í, Muslim, Sikh, Jewish and Christians sisters and brothers.
