We are deep into planning for our summer faith formation programming for children and youth. Here's all you need to know about what our summer programming will look like.

- We hope to offer <u>three opportunities for faith formation</u> for our children and youth, since they are not accommodated for in the Sunday service (one service at 10:00 a.m.) over the summer.
- **YOUTH Contemplation Room.** We've been curating self-led activities to guide middle and high school students in their faith formation. Youth can also volunteer to assist with the younger children by visiting www.tinyurl.com/uucrSummer2018.
- Based on feedback from last summer that Founders Hall was too stimulating, we would like to offer two rooms for children in pre-K through 5th grade.
 - One room will be spiritual makerspace with creative supplies to make sacred objects like mandalas, labyrinths, geodesic domes, etc. This will be a more activity-oriented room.
 - The second room will be a quieter space for contemplation and reflection with books, knitting, needlepoint, and other quiet building activities.

Our Whole Lives: Lifespan Sexuality Education

This year, UUCR attempted something it never attempted before—we offered three levels of Our Whole Lives (OWL) in one year! We successfully offered K-1, 4th-6th grade, and 7th-9th grade OWL! We served over 40 children/youth between the ages of five and fifteen. What an amazing gift this congregation has given to these young people, their families and communities. Thanks to the OWL facilitators, our children and youth are more equipped to make healthy decisions, keep healthy boundaries, and have healthy relationships.

The congregation will continue the tradition of being leaders in the OWL community by hosting an OWL Facilitator Training at UUCR this June. People from all over the region will come here to be trained to be facilitators in Jr./Sr. High OWL. **There are a few spots still available for people from UUCR to be trained.**

You don't need any prior experience to be an OWL facilitator; though experience working with children is helpful. Some of our current facilitators have day jobs as government contractors, non-profit leaders, and even scientists. You can get trained and teach for a year or two and then take off for a year or two.

The rewards of being an OWL facilitator are priceless. Elementary OWL facilitator Michael Mignano states, "*Each Sunday in OWL is an opportunity for ministry. Watching our children wrestle with the complex issues of gender, sexuality, and consent in their own free and responsible search for truth and meaning is an honor. Their maturity, inquisitiveness, and compassion continually amaze me.*" You too can be a part of this holy and sacred work by registering to attend the **OWL Facilitator Training on June 1-3 at UUCR**.

Eighth Principle

As UUCR is already committed to continuing the work of Racial Justice within our congregation and beyond, the Racial Justice Working Group is asking for a vote but the UUCR membership at the May 20 Congregational Meeting on a motion which may state:

"We, the members of UUCR, support the Unitarian Universalist Association in moving toward incorporating an 8th Principle into our UU Principles that may be stated below:

We the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by building a diverse, multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

In preparation, it is important to think about not only what is being asked of us, but who is doing the asking and why it is important to them and to us. Black Lives of UU is an organizing collective of Black UUs working to expand their role and visibility as Black people within our shared faith of Unitarian Universalism. Please carefully read the 8th Principle background material provided by them at https://www.8thprincipleuu.org/background.

At last year's UUA General Assembly, after much discussion, GA delegates voted for the UUA to appoint a commission to consider adding an 8th Principle. The exact language is here: "Appointment of a Study Commission GA 2017" (If you are reading this in print and *do not* have a way to access these two files online, please email call Adrian Graham, Director of Communications & Membership, at 301-762-7666 x5 for paper copies).

Samuel H. Grant: Profile of a Founding Member

In the spring of 1956 a small group of dreamers and doers, most of them young white couples with children, decided to form a Unitarian church in Rockville. They worked hard, and on September 9, 1956, 33 people signed the membership book, establishing the Rockville Unitarian Center. A seven-person Board of Managers conducted business and governed the new congregation. There were six men and a woman, which for 1956 was not a bad ratio. What is more surprising is that one of those men, Samuel "Sam" H. Grant was African American.

Who was Sam Grant? Fortunately for us, he responded to a



survey asking members about career, hobbies, and interests. In 1959 Sam was in his late thirties—married with a young son. He worked as a voucher examiner at the Department of Labor, and took night courses at American University in Public Administration. Jewell Golden, a long-time UUCR member, remembers Sam and his wife Alice as being pleasant and active in church affairs. In addition to being one of our first board members, Sam sang in the church choir, and Alice was on the religious education committee. Sam was also involved in other organizations and listed many hobbies and interests including bridge, dancing, camping, and discussions of religion and world events.

Sam was a member until around 1964 when for unknown reasons he drops off the roll. Another mystery is why Sam traveled to Rockville from his home in northwest DC rather than going to All Souls Church, Unitarian, in Washington, which would have been closer. Whatever the explanation, it's obvious that he was welcome and respected here in an era when segregation was still prevalent in Maryland.
